On Sunday, our Coronation Service included some royal music and readings and the flower ladies had made red, white and blue arrangements. Pat's delicious "Queen Mother's" cake was served afterwards.

On 10th June a bat survey was carried out by an ecol-

ogist. Sonic equipment and a video camera were employed to record the presence and species of bat. Fortunately for us, very few bats were seen or heard and no roost could be identified. However a further survey will be needed in July to check whether roost-

ing is occurring at that time. The ecologist advised that we may proceed with the interior investigative works with caution very soon, having also

received the go ahead from the Diocesan office and English Heritage. Following a pre-contract meeting with the PCC, the church architect, representatives from the building company carrying out the works and other professionals, stage 1 works should start during July.

Hazel our churchwarden and Margaret of Save All Saints both took part in the Hunts Community Radio "Over to You" programme last week to give an update on the restoration project and our fundraising. The presenter kindly suggested advertising our flower festival for us and asked if we would like to return at the end of the year to give a progress report on the restoration.

On 28th July there will be no 8 am service. However all are invited to the Patronal Festival of St James at Spaldwick at 9.30 am when a Eucharist service will be led by Rev Stephen Bowring, vicar of Kimbolton.

We are delighted that Jill Dighton has offered to take our family service on 7th July so we hope to have a good number in the congregation to welcome her.

On 30th July, Jill's son Adam is giving a talk in the village hall at 8 pm. Adam is a military history tutor and this should be a very interesting evening. Adam is kindly giving any donations to the restoration fund so do support him and us if you can. You will see Adam's advertisement for his talk on page 5.

Grafham Oil Syndicate Grafham Oil Syndicate is now 18 months old and around 350,000 litres and £200,000 later, we have managed to collectively keep about £20,000 in our pockets, thanks to bulk purchasing.

Grafham has 250 households, the majority dependent on oil. We have 125 mem-

PARISH NEWS...

June 2013

By the time you are reading this item you may have already noticed that work has been carried out to the street lighting in Grafham. All of our lamps are being renewed, but the posts are not being

changed and we are not losing any lamp-posts. Because of

this it was not necessary to consult with the Parish Council and this is why we received no correspondence.

The Village Hall Project Committee has met with a representative from ACRE (Action with Communities in Rural England). This was, primarily to discuss the plans and the viability given the estimated cost of the project.

ACRE are clear that funding is likely to be available and have offered assistance in pitching funding bids in the right way to improve the chances of success. It is probable that the project will need to be managed by at least one and possibly two project managers. If you have, or know of anyone who has these skills, the Parish Council would like to hear from you.

The Community Shop committee reported that sales of

shares are beginning to take off. Thirty-four have now been sold. A £2000 bursary has been received to help with set-up costs and professional fees. The most urgent requirements now are a lease for the land at the village hall and planning



permission to site the shop at the village hall. Once these are in place, fund-raising can begin in earnest. The committee will be attending Ellington Gala

where they hope to increase membership significantly. Several people from Ellington have already volunteered their services which, together with Grafham's volunteers, brings the total to around 35.

Work to two ash trees in Hartham Close has been recommended for approval. Sadly, these trees are showing signs of ash dieback disease and the work on the trees is partly to help rescue them.

Cllr David King will be attending the next County/District Council surgery which is on Saturday 6th July at the village hall in the morning.

The date of the next Parish Council meeting is Tuesday 9th July 2013 at 7.30pm in the village hall.


The museum has just had its 500,000th visitor since we opened in 1962. Visitors have come from all over the world in that time, as well as from close to home.

Grafham Cricket Club

The second home game of the season was played against Bedford Hospital Wanderers on the last Saturday in May. Bedford Hospital Wanderers opened the batting and were soon in trouble at 33 for 5, caused by 2 run-outs, and 3 catches, but then the inevitable happened, two batsman who had hardly scored all season went on scored over a 100 runs before the next wicket fell. Tom Chester and Adi Love were the pick of the Grafham bowlers, Tom finishing on 3 wkts for 31, and Adi on 4wkts for 40. Bedford Hospital Wanderers completed their innings on 215 for 9.

Grafham's response was steady, but apart from an exhilarating flourish of 4 6s in Rob Forsdick's 40, Grafham never looked like making the Bedford Hospital Wanderers score, and were all out for 100.

In the away game against Bedford Malayalees, Grafham's batting was entirely different. The Malayalees has two genuine quick bowlers who could have made batting a torrid affair, on a pitch that was green and which allowed the ball to seam both ways. The opening pair of Duncan Palmer and Adam Dighton built a solid start of 34, before Adam was caught at deep mid off. Will Lancaster, the next bat then proceeded to become the star of the Grafham batting by scoring 75 not out: aided and abetted by the rest of the team with extras to score 173 for 9.



Tom Chester and Adam Dighton opened the Grafham bowling and were successful in limiting the Malayalees scoring. It was during this period of bowling that the Malayalees opening bat gloved a ball to the Grafham wicket keeper, who caught it. The

batsman was about to walk, but when he saw the umpire was not giving him out; he stayed. This act altered the whole tenor of the game. Although the Malayalees lost wickets steadily, they managed to pass the Grafham total in the fading twilight. It was the batsman who everyone on the Grafham side concluded was out when he had scored 10, then went on to score an "unbeaten" 76, giving the Malayalees the game. All the Grafham players had a strong sense of feeling cheated.

The next game against Riseley was Tom Chester's first victory as Captain. The all round bowling performance of the Grafham team limited Riseley to being all out on 79, with Adi Love being the top wicket taker with 4, with Chris Dighton with 2. Will Lancaster again topped the batting with 47 not out, with Grafham getting the necessary 80 runs for the loss of 2 wkts.



Let's stick to the facts

I was disappointed to read another letter regarding speeding in the village that was full of inaccuracies and virtually devoid of fact. Over the last few editions of the *Grafham Gossip* the letters'

page has been dominated by opinions on this matter without being armed with the correct information. As a Parish Councillor and father of a 7 year old son, speeding is something that I take very seriously but I choose only to deal with the facts.

Mr Smith raised his concerns at one of our meetings as did others. As a result, the Council were kindly leant a speed gun for a limited time, by Councillor Downes, to measure the extent of the problem. Unlike the suggestion from Mr Smith, the recordings were taken during the week at peak times and at the weekend at various locations around the village so that a representative set of results could be obtained. The results are published for all to see on the Grafham website.

We would all like to see motorists drive with care and attention and within the legal speed limit through our village. From my point of view, the results overwhelmingly show that the vast majority of motorists do this (allowing for +/-10% error on equipment).

Unfortunately it neither helps deal with speeding nor presents the truth when less than half the story is reported and the content is based on opinion and hearsay. In order to present an accurate representation I would hope that in future people ensure that they are in full possession of the facts before committing pen to paper.

The Pratt family home in Grafham - do you have any information about it?



My great-grandmother, Susan Pratt, daughter of William Pratt, was born in Grafham in 1857. The house in the photograph is supposedly her family home in Grafham. Her mother was Lucy Cook. Both William and Lucy were from Gloucestershire. Neither appear to have died in Grafham.

I have no idea why or how Susan Pratt came to the United States. She married Robert Holliday Candler in 1875 in Illinois, about an hour drive (on today's roads) from St. Louis. Susan Pratt and Robert Candler ultimately produced eleven children, most of whom lived and died near their birthplace in west-central Illinois. One settled in Vancouver, Canada, another in Arizona. Many were either farmers, or married to farmers.

Robert Candler's father was Cant Candler, from Seamer, near Scarborough, North Riding, in Yorkshire.

Thank you for recycling

We would like to thank you and residents throughout Cambridgeshire for recycling 54% of your waste. This puts us well above the national average of 39% and on track to meeting our target of 60% by 2020.

You may have heard recent news of problems at the Mechanical Biological Treatment (MBT) plant in Waterbeach. This machine was built to separate and process 'black bag' waste in Cambridgeshire. When working, the plant pulls out items which can be processed to reduce the volume of waste sent to landfill by half, whilst also capturing greenhouse gas emissions. Unfortunately, part of the turning equipment for this machine suffered serious mechanical failure in September 2012.

Work is underway to manufacture the new parts required to rebuild the machinery and to prepare the plant for installation, which is due to be completed before the end of 2013. In the meantime we'd like to remind you that the breakdown at the MBT only affects how 'black bag' waste is dealt with. Therefore we urge you to continue to recycle as much as possible through your normal household recycling service, which is collected and processed in the usual way. Recycling as much as possible reduces both the amount of waste going to landfill and demand on natural resources.

We would like to reassure you that the PFI contract the County Council has in place with the MBT contractor means the authority, and therefore council tax payers are protected from any additional costs incurred because of the breakdown.

You can find out more about the Journey of Waste at the annual Recycling Open Day on Saturday 13 July from 10am to 4pm at AmeyCespa's Waterbeach site, just off the A10 between Cambridge and Ely.

At the event you can take a guided coach tour of the site; join a walking tour of the new Materials Recycling Facility; enjoy plant and vehicle displays; find out how to reuse and recycle more of your waste and take part in activities for all the family. Entry is free.
