PARISH NEWS March 2014


A number of residents attended the meeting this month to give the Parish Council their views on the proposal to sell for development, open land on Meadowground. The Council took notice of

As victims of a recent burglary, we thought it helpful to give readers some useful information to help them protect their belongings. Being "wise after the event" we have learned the following:-

local Burglary

Conservatory doors, although looking secure, can be further protected by "sash jammers" which fix to the top and bottom of the door making it impossible to open from outside even when unlocked.

Small vibration alarms, available from most DIY stores or on the internet, can be fixed to doors and windows.

It's advisable to have your jewellery and



other personal items valued or at least to take photographs of them so that this information may be produced when making insurance claims.



We hope you do not have the unpleasant experience of coming home to find you have had a break in but hopefully these suggestions will help you to avoid the obvious distress, especially of losing items of sentimental value which can never be replaced.

Cops Elderly Targeted -Bank accounts, Pin numbers

A series of incidents have been seen across the Force and also nationally. The incidents relate to the elderly being targeted by offenders who are purporting to be a police officer.

The phoney police officers make claims by phone including:

- A criminal has been arrested with a list of names and addresses, including yours.
- Your bank is under investigation for putting fraudulent bank notes into your bank account.
- They allege that the your bank account has had suspicious activity on it in another area

They then advise the victim to call their bank using a number on the back of their bank card, or the police on 101. The victim hangs up but the caller does not and the call is not terminated.

As a result and without realising it, the victim starts talking to the fraudster again, thinking they have called their bank or the police.

Following a conversation, the offender either claims he needs their PIN number as it might be compromised or that they should withdraw several thousands of pounds so that the 'police' can forensically check the bank notes as part of their investigation.

The caller says he will send a courier or taxi to their home to collect the card or money. A smartly dressed man or innocently involved courier or taxi driver will arrive at the victim's home. The cash or the bank card and PIN number is then taken and used to withdraw cash.

You would never be asked by the bank or the police to provide your PIN number.

If you receive calls of this nature do not hand over details.

Contact the police immediately.

Who do I call if there is a power cut?

UK Power Networks owns and maintains electricity cables and lines across London, the South East and East of England, making sure your lights stay on.

What causes power cuts?

There are several scenarios that commonly cause power cuts. These include:

- Bad weather when severe winds cause damage to overhead power lines or wind-borne debris and trees fall on power lines pulling them down
- Water if it gets underground and into the cables
- Other people working near overhead lines or digging underground which can occasionally result in damage to our electricity cables.

What we do to mitigate this

We work hard to prevent power cuts. We have an extensive tree-trimming programme to prevent trees from damaging cables. Our flood defence measures are effective at protecting against water damage. We provide plans of where our electricity cables are and we train other companies' staff to ensure other people do not damage our cables. Overall, each year we spend about £600 million to maintain and replace power lines ensuring that the electricity network remains reliable.

Vulnerable customers

During a power cut we understand that some people may need extra support and offer priority assistance for our vulnerable customers.

If we know where you are, we can help. We hold a list, called Priority Services Req-

ister, of thousands of customers who would feel particularly vulnerable during a power cut and we provide them with extra support if needed.

Who can apply?

Customers who are dependent on medical equipment; customers who are chronically sick or have a disability; customers who are blind, visually impaired or deaf; customers with young babies; nursing or residential homes and elderly customers.

We will consider other cases too if you think you would feel particularly vulnerable during a power cut.

What we can do

We can't get your power back on more quickly (although we will try our hardest) but we can:

- Call you pro-actively if we expect bad weather in your area that could result in a power cut and offer useful advice on how to prepare
- Offer you a special priority phone number that you • can call if you have a power cut
- Provide with a generator where necessary or book vou into a hotel
- Keep you updated during a power cut, either by sending you text messages or calling you
- With your agreement, we can ask the British Red Cross to visit your home for extra help and support.




