

PARISH NEWS June 2021

Neighbourhood Plan

The creation of the Neighbourhood Plan is complete!

Last month the Neighbourhood Plan team spent time reviewing the comments received from our first formal consultation (Regulation 14). We will now submit all the documents needed for HDC to run the next formal stage of consultation (Regulation 16) and then on to the independent examiner. This will be followed by a sequence of further approval stages, culminating in a referendum next year.



We are confident the Neighbourhood Plan reflects the wishes and aspirations of our community, whilst also complying with the regulations.

Community Heat Scheme

Element Energy are continuing to analyse the technical solutions and financial data, but it is becoming increasingly clear that the project may not be financially viable. The financial model for Swaffham Prior has been investigated by Element Energy, with support from Cambridgeshire County Council, but whilst that project continues, it may not be a model we would wish to pursue. The Capex for Swaffham Prior has increased substantially during the project's life and is currently around £12M, equating to around £40k per house. Financing will be through a range of government grants, and includes £6.8M of carbon credits to be purchased by CCC during the 60-year lifetime of the heat scheme.

The final report from Element Energy is due by the end of June, but in the meantime, the team is starting to consider alternatives. One possibility might be a community purchase scheme of individual ASHPs, funded by a combination of government grants (the RHI successor) and the sale of carbon credits.

High-speed Broadband

Openreach have supplied a cost estimate, which is very much higher than expected, so will need to be considered by the PC on the 22nd June.

Solar PV for the Shop

The Solar PV system mounted on the Village Hall continues to provide significant financial savings for our Community Shop, as well as a significant environmental benefit. The performance data available to us includes a neat little monitor of our CO2 savings on the SolarEdge website.

Tri Village Meeting – Sustainable Heating Virtual Meeting 7.00 pm July 15th

Finally, it feels like summer is here, yet our conversation about heating continues! The topic has again hit the national headlines, and the community heating project has news to share too. The feasibility study looking at a heat network for Grafham, Perry and Great Staughton is complete and the report is ready to share at a tri-village virtual meeting -7.00pm, Thursday 15th July. The UK's 'Just Transition' and our Villages!

The future of gas and oil boilers has become a topic of speculation in newspapers and headlines. For over a decade, the UK has enjoyed an incentivised approach for households to convert to renewable energy and heating but it is now likely that policy will turn from 'carrot' to 'stick' by March 2022. How can the UK build the infrastructure required to go green, without leaving some of the population behind, and struggling to pay bills? We need to deliver a "Just Transition" to green energy.

It is anticipated that converting homes to renewable heating solutions will cost up to £2bn. Communal heat networks have already been outlined as one important solution with £270m earmarked to deliver this type of technology, which delivers heat to each home from a local energy centre. There is also a Clean Heat Grant, which would provide up to £4,000 to individual households supporting changes to renewable solutions.

Your Parish Councils, with the help of experts in the field, are looking at these emerging funds to try and see that no one is left behind by the future changes. Other communities throughout the country are also seeking a solution that works for them, such as Barcombe, Swaffham Prior and Outwood, and Stithians. We are contacting these other villages, to share learning and advice on developing a project.

The feasibility report evaluates the potential of a heat network for each of the villages involved and suggests what type of renewable heating could be most suitable. The Parish Council's project team (which includes some of our local engineers) have been putting the project engineers, Element Energy, through their paces to make sure this report gives a robust steer on the options available.


Under the Carpet

Edward Biffin

My last few articles have described objects found in or on the soil of Orchard Row. For the first twenty years of my residence

in Grafham, while I owned both of my present cottages, the second one was occupied by my tenant, an almost life-long inhabitant of the village, Laurie Jeffs. In the mid 1990s Laurie moved to an old folk's home and this article, the first of two, describes things found during the refurbishment and integration of the two cottages. In the 'two-up-two down' cottage there was a main bedroom, and a secondary one integrated with the top of the 'staircase in a cupboard'. This latter room was sparsely furnished with a cast-iron bedframe and a load of rubbish sitting on a threadbare carpet.

And the carpet had been rather carefully underlaid by newspapers and magazines over the bare floorboards. In the walking areas they were torn and fragmented, but under the bed there was a yellowing, slightly tatty at the edges, but otherwise well-preserved copy of the Hunts Post dated Thursday February 3rd, 1949.



For the first time in its history, Grafham has a regular On Saturday 'bus service. On Saturday Premier Travel commenced a twice-weekly (Tuesdays and Saturdays) service from Huntingdon to Brampton, Graf-ham, Gt. Staughton, and Pertenhall.

On the first day many of the villagers took advantage

of the new facilities.

A spokesman of Premier Travel told the "Post" on Tuesday that he was confident that the village would support the new service.

Two buses will run in each direction on Tuesday, and three on Saturday. Last bus to Grafham on a Saturday will leave Huntingdon at 10.30 p.m.

And in the middle of the front page - just between the two top photos - Grafham's first ever bus service arrives! Did the villagers celebrate? We don't know, as while

virtually every other village around had a local news paragraph on page 7, Grafham had no entry. FEBRUARY 3, 1949

However, the regular Bunny mid Fellowship article on page 3 782 goes into the derivation of tion village names, including Grafham. The Bunnies was

HOW VILLAGES GOT THEIR NAMES

***** Bunny Fellowship ****

a charity supporting children, especially children in hospital and the construction of a new children's ward. It seems to have been named after the collecting of Queen Victoria pennies – the ones with her hair in a 'bun' – as charity donations.

Other local items included the advert 'Meet your friends at -THE BRAMPTON HUT HOTEL - excellent food in pleasant surroundings.' That was the old hotel of course, before the A1 was dual carriageway and before there was a roundabout, just a staggered crossroads with a guide-post and the hotel. (For an old photograph of the hotel, see the online Grafham Gossip April 2012 page 7, on the Grafham website www.grafham.org.uk) Meanwhile, over at Gaynes Hall Borstal

Institution, an exhibition of the arts and handicrafts classes included – dressmaking!

Also just to show that nothing changes, the first meetings of the Local Government Boundary Commission were announced, covering Cambridge, Hunts and Peterborough.

Part 2 of this article will cover the magazines - copies of Radio Times - again from the 1946-49 period.

Aqua Park at Grafham Water

I would be happy for you to publish the email that I sent to Anglian Water in the *Grafham Gossip* and I thought that the village might also be interested to know that neither Perry nor Grafham Parish Councils had been consulted on the development. Dear Anglian Water,

It is with sadness (maybe I am the wrong age) that I learn about the opening of a theme park here at Grafham Water.

Our Village Plan highlighted that most of the local community are living here because of the peaceful nature of the environment, the access to nature and wildlife and the rural community.

Indeed if you read your Google reviews you will see that it is the engagement with nature that your visitors also appreciate.

The increased carpark price to £6 and soon to be £8 has put pressure on that environment with your visitors abusing both our villages as free places to park.

Church Road and Church Hill in Grafham have become a rat race for people seeking to find somewhere to park and now you are going to encourage even more cars and more visitors.

Has there been an impact study on the effect of the new theme park on noise levels, traffic levels, sufficiency of parking, and effect on the wild birds that live on the reservoir?

I would be interested to hear if you are now going to allow free swimming and launching of boats from the North Shore as it seems that you are opening this area up to all?

That aside and most importantly what consultation has been undertaken with the local communities and indeed why we not notified of the planning application?

The other sites where these theme parks are situated have much greater infrastructure and are able to site the park away from the majority of the wildlife.

Lakeside Shopping Centre, at Thurrock, Cardiff Bay Barrage are not rural environments and Rutland Water is considerably bigger; the theme park there is tucked away from the main reservoir area.

Anglian Water is notorious for not responding to concerns about the industrial solar park and now you feel the need to further blight the natural environment.

Perhaps it is time for you to come and listen to the communities of Grafham and Perry; I am sure not all will share my views, but it would be appropriate for you to seek them.

Recipe of the month - Courgette Pizza Boats

- 4 medium courgettes
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 75g diced chorizo
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 335g cherry tomatoes, halved

- 1 tbsp tomato purée
- 1 tsp dried mixed herbs
- 150g ball mozzarella, torn into small pieces
- 28g fresh basil, roughly torn



- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C/fan 180°C/gas mark 6. Halve the courgettes lengthways. Scoop out the seeds using a teaspoon and roughly chop them. Place the courgette halves on a roasting tray, brush with the oil and bake for 12-15 minutes, until just soft.
- 2. Add the diced chorizo to a medium saucepan over a medium heat and cook for 3-4 minutes, until golden and the oil has started to release. Add the garlic and cook for a further minute.
- 3. Add the courgette seeds, tomatoes, tomato purée and dried herbs with seasoning and simmer for 5 minutes with the lid on, until the tomatoes have softened and burst slightly. Remove the lid and cook for a further 5 minutes until thickened. Stir through half the basil.
- 4. Preheat your grill to the highest setting. Divide the tomato mixture between the roasted courgettes and top with the mozzarella. Place under the grill for 3-4 minutes, until the mozzarella is melted and golden.
- 5. Top with the remaining basil and divide between 4 plates to serve.

Continuing thoughts on Shifting Baseline Syndrome David Cudby

I'd like to say a little more on Shifting Baseline Syndrome, which I wrote about last month. I've been thinking about perspectives, how they change, how personal they can be. Our shifting perceptions, recollections and memories of the natural world seasons is a function of the quality of formal and informal record keeping and our memory with all of its failings and biases.

As a beekeeper of a dozen years, this spring has been memorable. Every beekeeper will have had different experiences this year and can make their own *'historical comparisons'* depending upon their number of years in beekeeping.

In my locality March was exceptionally dry, April was exceptionally cold and May was exceptionally wet. After the year's early botanical bonuses of crocus and snowdrop, most flowering plants and trees were late to yield nectar and pollen. Despite all of that, three colonies are strong; one is struggling and two were lost over winter (put that down to beekeeper incompetence).

Taking together the impact of weather, colony strength and age and beekeeper actions, every beekeeping year is a different experience. This year for example I fed my bees right into May. Unique in my experience. Despite all of that, in the final days of May my strongest colony swarmed. Testament to how well it was doing. Hey ho!

This speedy making up of ground suggests to me that no matter how the exceptional nature of this spring may look to me, in the long evolutionary history of honeybees, surviving tough unseasonal periods of weather are within the *genetic memory and capability* of the species.

Just think Honeybees evolved between 74 and 146 million years ago. Homo sapiens evolved about 200,000 years ago. So, honeybees (as an evolving species) have had 370 to 730 times more experience of the vagaries of the natural world than their apiary masters.

There are two things particularly on my mind just now. The first I have explained and that is how from my limited perspective this spring has been something of a beekeeper's nightmare, exceptional and challenging.

The other thing challenging me stems from my continued reading of the James Lovelock books on Gaia. As you may remember, over several decades James Lovelock has developed his theory of Gaia, the hypothesis that ours is a self-regulating planet working as if a single organism. Lovelock hypothesises that the biosphere (all living things) influence and shape the abiotic or non-living parts of the planet e.g., rocks and lakes, rivers and oceans. In turn, living things evolve by natural selection to adjust to the non-living world.

Within this there is of course climate (and weather). I struggle a bit with the distinction between climate and weather. I know that the classic distinction is that climate is what occurs on a global scale over decades, centuries or millennia and weather is what we experience as short term or seasonal local atmospheric conditions. We have the luxury of three score years and ten, also documents that inform us about previous periods of three score years and ten. So, we understand a bit about trends with their in-built annual or seasonal variations. What if you are a beetle or a bird with a life span often measured in months, or even a hedgehog with a lifespan typically 2 to 5 years?

These creatures and honeybees too don't have diaries and as far as we know they lack self-awareness. For them as individuals all is short term, survival day by day, no scope for comparing one period with another just their physiology and programmed behaviours to see them through. No scope for concerning themselves with what is occurring on a global scale, reacting only to what is happening within centimetres, metres or tens of metres. Similarly for plants.

Lovelock has no dispute with claims that climate is changing rapidly at the moment and that human activity is a major cause. He believes that it isn't too late to take meaningful action but does take issue with climate scientists' models. He believes that their cosy consensus is misguided for two reasons. First, climate modelling is a statistic exercise with large uncertainties around modelling predictions - so how can there be a consensus about the predictions. Second as those pictures from space in the 1960s showed, our planet is largely water and would better be called planet water. Then the emphasis in climate modelling would shift towards the effects of the life in the oceans and how ocean chemistry affects climate.

By the way, the honeybee colony that I spoke about earlier, the one that swarmed at the end of May, well as I write, the colony just swarmed again. Putting aside this beekeeper's obvious lack of skill, three months of exceptionally unfavourable weather and much head scratching on my part clearly has not lessened that colony's ability to thrive.



Sustainable Picnicking

When planning a picnic:

- It is a good opportunity to use up leftovers, mix meats and veg with pasta or cous cous or into a salad
- Wrap sandwiches in reusable beeswax wraps or place in a reusable tub to avoid creating waste
- Veg sticks are a great addition to any picnic and can be dipped in humous or a tasty pate. If you plan it well enough, you can make dips from scratch in reusable tubs too
- You could even make a pizza Stromboli, a pizza rolled up when still warm. Delicious!
- Think ahead, will you need any cutlery/plates/bowls? If so, think about what you already have at home. Standard cutlery works just fine, and if you don't have plastic plates, what about using reusable tub instead?

- Don't forget some fluids. If you can't buy drinks when out, think about taking reusable bottles, possibly just filling with water and taking cordial to add when there, giving a choice of flavours.
- If you might want a hot drink while out, remember to take your reusable cup with you. Did you know The National Trust offer 25p discount when you use your own cup? Alternatively, take a flask of your favourite hot beverage with you.
- Empty tubs can be used to take home peels and cores for the compost bin
- Remember an additional bag for any other mess that may be created. If is better to take it and not need it, than need it and not have it.

The Countryside code, updated in April 2021, also has some great advice in how to behave when out and about, and the most important ones apply even more now due to the Covid 19 virus. The most important aspect of this is leave no trace of your visit, take all your litter home with you; you brought it so take it back. This counts for your dog waste too, bag it and bin it – any public waste bin will do. If bins are full, find another, or take home.



Care for nature, helping others enjoy it too! Leave rocks, stones, plants and trees as you find them. Animals can become trapped or be harmed by food containers, face masks and anything left behind. Be kind. Be considerate. Be the change. And enjoy our beautiful countryside.
