

Playing Field Football Club Proposal Update

The Parish Council and Village Hall have been in discussions with Huntingdon Town Football Club (the Hunters) regarding potential use of the playing field.

The Hunters are seeking additional pitches for boys, girls and pan-disability players to play games this season and for future seasons and they would like boys and girls from Grafham to join the club. The proposal is to limit matches to one per week to be held at the weekend. Three sizes of pitches will be marked out on the playing field and the Hunters have reduced their pitch requirement to using just one at any time

As part of the proposal:

- 1. The village hall will not be available for use by the Hunters.
- 2.Toilet Facilities The Hunters accept that the Village Hall will not be available and propose providing three portaloos, which could be sited behind the multi-use games area (MUGA). They will maintain them and arrange emptying, probably once a year.
- 3. Car Parking They will encourage car sharing and anticipate no more than 15 cars. The Hunters are liaising with the Cinnamon to accommodate any additional remaining cars.
- 4.Dog walkers will need to keep their dogs on a lead during matches and clear up any mess, as they already have to.
- 5. Noise With just one match, the Hunters consider the noise level should be no greater than other children's group activities that we might normally have within the village.
- 6. Storage A 20ft shipping container which will be required to store goalposts and ground maintenance equipment could be located behind the MUGA next to the current existing container.
- 7.Bins and Litter Picking The Hunters will take full responsibility for clearing up any litter dropped by those attending the matches.

Why Grafham?

The Hunters have investigated various sites and found all to be fully used, with the exception of Grafham. The Parish Council feel this is a great opportunity to bring more community activity and energy to the village.



Therefore, the Parish Council has provisionally approved the hire of the playing field to the Hunters. A "Heads of Agreement" is being drafted up and subject to approval on both sides and signing of the document, the Hunters will start using the playing field from November.

Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs (MVAS)

The solar panels are working well and keeping the batteries adequately powered.

Dog Waste Reminder - Playing Field

The Parish Council has noticed a growing number of dog poo bags being left around the playing field, especially in the vegetation at the bottom end. It is great that owners are bagging up after their dogs – thank you! But please remember to **dispose of the bags properly in the bin**. Leaving them on the ground or in the bushes creates a health hazard and spoils the area for everyone. Let's keep our village clean and welcoming for all.

The Parish Council kindly requests that dog owners keep their dogs on leads when children are playing on the playing field.





Things are very much quieter now with the cooler nights and damp dull days keeping visitors away in search of sunnier climes. Nevertheless, the shop chugs on and we have been making plans for Christmas and even more excitingly our long term future.

Christmas is Coming, and the...

Does any anyone have a fat goose for Christmas? They are delicious, not as meaty as a turkey and the advantage to this is that there are not another 11 days of "going cold turkey". Anyway, enough distractions. The point is that the GFB (Grafham Festive Bag) will be returning again this year, but in a slightly different format. The arrangement will be that shoppers will pick their own bag and provided they buy at least £30 of starred goods will get a free hessian bag* and a 20% discount on the starred goods. The starred goods will be appropriate Christmassy food and gifts *while stocks last*.

Planning Permission Granted

Thanks to David, Martin and the Parish Council we now have planning permission for a permanent slightly larger L-shaped structure on our existing site. It will have a loo and space for a mini coffee-bar which all sounds very exciting. However, we are only in the foothills of what needs to be done. Our next steps include getting grant funding, the team are hopeful that the various grants around may provide all or most of the costs covered, though we may also need to do some fund raising if there is a shortfall. We also need to finalise the specifications so we get as many costs covered upfront in the grant application. One small step forward for Grafham...

It creates interest in customers and may identify a new opportunity, so thank you Belinda for introducing various new items such as Lipton's Iced Tea, Very Lazy cook's ingredients, Oasis & Rio drinks, some funky earrings and new Real Norfolk cakes.













The Goughmeister's latest taste challenge

The Jams and Pickles were a delight and I have managed to work through several jars so far. Like the delicious honey the shop stocks, it has the added advantage of being branded Grafham Village Shop so they can double up nicely as gifts (although mine don't get that far... they would be good for the GFB). My favourite? Lemon and Lime Curd, it's like Lemon Curd with attitude. I am on the second jar in two weeks, and that is with Fruits of the Forest Jam and Raspberry Conserve finished as well. All have been absolutely delicious, although I do ladle it on a little thick. I personally find them fruity and not overly sugary and very moreish — be warned, they are addictive. As well as the jams there are a range of marmalades which are already proving popular. There are also chutneys and pickles, and, although I have not as yet tried them all, I would recommend Sweet Chilli Chutney, not particularly hot but full of flavour and goes with just about anything — I want to try one of those new Norfolk Cakes but have also started a diet so they may have to wait a while.

New Committee Members Needed

Debbie and Patrick who have been co-chairing the shop and sharing leadership responsibilities plan to step down from the shop committee at the AGM in 2026. They will have done 3 ½ years in the hot seat and would like to take break. As a result, we need to ask other Grafham residents to take a turn at the tiller. Debbie (accounts & banking) and Patrick (marketing and business admin) have found that sharing the role has made the job a lot easier and plays to their strengths. The Committee already has some well-seasoned and experienced shop supporters, but we need fresh blood and someone willing to take over some of these not too onerous roles. Key things to note – it is quite fun, a novel experience and satisfying, you will learn new skills, meet new people, there is lots of support and training available and you do not have to work behind the till – tho' a little bit of hands-on activity is no bad thing. RHS Top Gardening Jobs for November

As the final golden leaves fall from the trees, the ground more frequently becomes a glittering carpet of frost. Tender plants will need protecting from frost, gales and freezing rains. Move plants into the greenhouse, or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it is worth wrapping plants or pots. Remember winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies well topped up.

- Clear up fallen leaves especially from lawns, ponds and beds
- 2. Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging
- 3. Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year
- 4. Prune roses to prevent wind-rock
- 5. Plant out winter bedding
- 6. Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem
- 7. Insulate outdoor containers from frost hessian sacking or reused bubble wrap works well
- 8. Sow some sweet peas indoors, putting them in a cold frost -free place as soon as they germinate
- 9. Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden
- 10.Don't burn your woody waste compost it or recycle into dead hedges or log piles

Sticky squash and sweet potato traybake

At the moment the supermarkets are full of butternut squash, you could even substitute pumpkin after the children have finished making lanterns!

Ingredients For 4 - 6 people.

For the traybake

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tbsp red wine vinegar
- 2 tsp honey
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 tsp cumin seeds
- 1 tsp smoked paprika
- ½ small pumpkin or 1 small butternut squash (approx. 600g/1lb 5oz), cut into 3cm/1¼in chunks, seeds reserved
- 2 sweet potatoes, cut into 3cm/11/4in chunks
- 2 red peppers, deseeded and cut into thick wedges
- 2 red onions, cut into thick wedges
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

For the crispy pumpkin seeds

- reserved seeds (from above),
 washed and patted dry with kitchen paper
- 1 tsp olive oil
- pinch smoked paprika

To serve

- 100g / 3½oz watercress or rocket
- 250g / 9oz natural yoghurt
- 1–2 tbsp sriracha (hot sauce)

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C/180C Fan
- 2. Whisk the oil, vinegar, honey, garlic and spices together in a large bowl. Add the vegetables, season with a pinch of salt and pepper and mix thoroughly. Tip everything into a large roasting tin and shake out into an even layer. Roast for 50 minutes, giving everything a shake and a mix halfway through cooking.
- 3. Meanwhile, make the crispy pumpkin seeds by mixing them with the oil and a pinch of salt. Spread out on a non-stick baking tray (or a tray lined with greaseproof paper) and bake alongside the vegetables for 20 minutes until crisp. Season with a pinch of smoked paprika and set aside to cool.
- 4. Remove the vegetables from the oven and stir through the watercress. Mix the yoghurt and sriracha together, drizzle over the vegetables and serve topped with the crispy pumpkin seeds.



The Population of Grafham 1841 to 1911 Part 9, where did the farmworkers live?

Continuing to look at dwellings and the Census, which last month disclosed an anomaly where 'Low Grafham' had multiple families but no apparent houses for them to live in, we now look at 1871, 1881 and 1891. The table below shows how the dwellings are grouped in the these censuses in the order they are catalogued. These years cover the period after the arrival of the railway and the erection of the first two sets of cottages in Breach Road (sometimes called 'Station Road').

The maps available to show where dwellings were located include the 1863 revision of the Olivia Bernard Sparrow (OBS) Estate map, the 1881 revision of the OS 1" map and the 1887 first edition OS 25" map.

In contrast to the 1841-1861 Censuses, every entry in the next three surveys can be related to a dwelling known to exist in the period, including the Breach Road cottages and the newly constructed farmworker cottages associated with Low, Village, Glebe (Rectory) and Top Farms. I have constructed diagrammatic representations of the village road and dwelling geography and the 1881 image has Church Road leading to Hill and Low Farms on the left and Brampton Road, which by this time had no dwellings on it, on the right. The main northbound road is Breach Road and the southbound continuation is Buckden Road ('Grafham' in 1891). To the west the second southbound road is Church Hill (Perry Road, or Village plus Glebe Farm in 1891). Church Road is called High Street + West End in 1871, Grafham Road + Grafham Street in 1881, and the first two 'Villages' in 1891.

Note that the diagram excludes East Perry, which was then part of Grafham. And that no maps show any dwellings in Grafham under what is now Grafham Water except for Low and Glebe Farm and their cottages.

As well as Farm labourers, which I now hope to cover in the next article, this period saw the presence of Railway Labourers for the first time, after the opening of the railway in 1866. Interestingly only one was living in the village near the station; the other four were in two groups near Orchard Row and Hill Farm where footpaths gave direct access to the track.

The reservoir is quite low; hardly surprising given the lack of rainfall, and we are obliged to cross over a beach of broken shells, clay and sand before we arrive at the water's edge. There's quite a breeze blowing as I lob a length of stick into the water and watch as the dog gingerly makes her way in to retrieve it. She has never been a swimmer as such and is happy just paddling around up to her chest and immersing her snout below the waves.

She grabs the stick and brings it back to shore where yours truly is then obliged to take it off of her and hurl it back into the water once more. This rather repetitive game continues for a while until the stick meets its end like so many others have – chewed and snapped into ever smaller bits. With the stick finally destroyed she looks at me as if to ask where it went. Some ten minutes later, we head back to dry land and continue our gentle plod around the edge of the reservoir.

We come across the usual mix of geese, swans, ducks, cormorants and grebes, most of whom are either resting gently by the water's edge or out in the water itself ducking and diving for food. They seem wholly unperturbed by our presence and certainly the dog never shows a desire to disturb them. We stand and watch a while before moving on.


The dog is now standing on the edge of an embankment that juts out into the water and is simply staring out over the pond; what has caught her attention, I know not. I call her, but she ignores me – I think she is beginning to go deaf – and it takes quite a few calls before she finally turns and rejoins me. I mock chase her, but she doesn't react and I think this is the signal to indicate that she is quite tired and ready to go home.

We follow a path through the trees and shortly join a broad track that will take us home. We turn left and some 50 yds later, we are at the bottom of Church Hill again, but instead of taking the tarmacked road we dive into the wooded plantation and walk parallel to the road. This, of course, allows for more stick-snapping opportunities, so progress is fairly slow. I look around me and watch the breeze catching the branches which sway gently and occasionally clatter against each other. It is quiet in here, almost sombre as we make our way through the stand while the daylight begins to decrease quite noticeably.

On the way, the dog seems to have chewed her way through half a hundredweight of wood – for those of you brought up on the metric system, a hundredweight is about 112 pounds,

which in turn, is around 50 kilos. I'll bet you're still none the wiser, eh? And don't get me started on rods, poles and perches!

Despite the slow progress, we eventually come upon a gap in the hedge



We stop by a pair of cottages opposite the old stables (or at least I think they used to be stables) where someone has placed a bowl of water out in the front for passing dogs. Again, I am assuming it has been done for this reason. If not, apologies to you! The dog stops and takes a long, steady draught of water. This seems to have re-invigorated her and with energy renewed, we continue to the junction, cross the road and then head along Brampton Road.

We eventually arrive at and then turn left into Van Diemans; at which point I just happen to spot the lights on in the Trout. How serendipitous is that? Well, you have to support these local ventures, don't you? With little hesitation, it must be said, we cross over and make our way to the pub like moths to the proverbial flame.

The interior of the Trout glows warmly and invitingly and we, or at least, me, simply cannot resist being drawn into its comforting bosom (you're probably not allowed to say that anymore.) I get a cheery welcome from the bar person (sorry, forgot the name) as I survey what's on offer. Just to be completely unoriginal, I opt for a pint o' bitter and dog happily gets a biscuit or two. This should keep us both happy for a while.

We settle down by a window and look out at the encroaching gloom of late afternoon. Again, it's just me, the dog and the bar person. I'm beginning to take this personally now! The dog lays down on the floor and starts to chew the biscuits while I sup the ale. I glug about a half before resting the glass back on the table. Ah, yes, very nice! I must say that it's difficult to think of a better way of wrapping up an afternoon walk, I reckon. Cheers!
