#### **Playing Field Football Club Update**

The Parish Council would like to confirm the "Agreement" has now been signed and preparations are in place for the installation of equipment ready for football matches to take place. A new shipping container has recently been delivered for the Football Club to provide much-needed storage.

Due to the wet winter season and soft ground conditions, the container has been placed in a *temporary* location for the time being. It will be moved to its intended site next year once the weather improves and the ground is firmer.

#### 2025 / 2026 Local Highway Improvement Initiative Bid

The Parish Council are pleased to announce we were successful in our bid to get Gateways installed at the entrance and exit points to the village. The Gateways are designed to highlight the entrance to the Parish and / or change of speed limit. The Parish Council are now in consultation with Cambridgeshire County Council to discuss next steps. Please note this is not a quick process and it can take up to 18 months for installation!



The Parish Council at the December meeting will be meeting to confirm their bid for the 2026/27 funding round. One suggestion put forward is to reduce the speed limit for Church Road / Hill. We would be grateful for residents' views on this suggestion either in person at the December meeting or by emailing the clerk at: clerk@grafhampc.org

#### Preferred Options Draft Local Plan to 2046

Following the Call for Sites Grafham Parish Council has received the email below from Huntingdonshire District Council with a link to the 'Preferred Options Draft Local Plan to 2046' which the District Council have now formally published for consultation: -

Within the Draft Local Plan document, you will see that one site only in Grafham has been allocated for inclusion in the Local Plan, namely Grafham 1, adjacent to 24 Cedar Close. This is allocated for residential development of up to 20 houses.

If you wish to submit any comments to the Parish Council as well as the District Council, please do so as soon as possible, to enable us to consider them in our response to the District Council. To make your comments to the District Council, you will have to register if you haven't already done so. Guidance on how to register and make comments is provided within the link.

Over these past months, I've been setting up systems to track casework so that residents' concerns are properly followed through, and I've established regular meetings with county officers and parish councils to bring everyone together and strengthen collaboration across our communities. I've attended a wide range of training sessions to get fully up to speed, ensuring I can represent you effectively and knowledgeably. I've started with what I see as the basics, and I am keen to now start regularly updating you on our work together as things progress.

It's a busy scheme of work, but one which I believe can directly help put our communities at the forefront of what's happening at county level, making sure local priorities are heard and acted upon.

Above all however, I see community outreach as the most vital part of my responsibilities; I'm pleased to be holding my first councillor surgery at 10:30am in the village hall on 6th December. I look forward to meeting residents there, listening to your concerns, and working together to make a positive difference.

Thank you for your kind donation. Our helpline, peer support groups and information resources are a lifeline for people affected by any neurologi-



## Make sure you're protected this winter

NHS Cambridgeshire & Peterborough urging anyone eligible for their COVID-19, flu, RSV or pneumococcal vaccines to make sure they've had them this winter. Each vaccine has a slightly different eligibility criteria:



Cambridgeshire and Peterborough

- RSV vaccine for anyone who is pregnant, aged 75-79, or anyone who turned 80 years old from 1st September 2024.
- Pneumococcal vaccine for anyone 65 or over (only one dose is needed).
- Flu vaccine for anyone aged 65 or over (including those who will be 65 by 31st March 2025); have certain long-term health conditions; are pregnant; live in a care home; are the main carer for an older or disabled person, or receive a carer's allowance; or live with someone who has a weakened immune system.
- COVID-19 vaccine for anyone aged 75+; those aged between six months and 74 years and have a weakened immune system because of a health condition or treatment; and people who live in a care home for older adults.

For some people who have got used to have their COVID-19 and flu vaccine together in winter, this might mean a change for them as the COVID-19 vaccine age criteria has changed from people over 65 to people over 75.

We have also been told that Blunham Dairies who supply our milk and dairy products have been sold to a semi-national dairy company, so we are reviewing who supplies what as we are keen to retain some of the popular products we got from Blunham's and also want to source some dairy products from Collins. And of course, both companies have minimum order requirements... anyway please bear with us while we make the changes.

#### An Aladdin's Cave of not quite Last-Minute Christmas Essentials

The John Lewis ad is out so it's time acknowledge the festive season is upon us so, amongst other things, time to plan the Christmas baking. With this in mind the Goughmeister sauntered across to the village shop for ingredients and what an Aladdin's cave it is. Along with all the basics: flours, sugars, baking powder and eggs there's raisins (to be cheerful?!), sultanas, dried fruit, spices, treacle, condensed milk, flavourings, decorations, mincemeat and more – the whole nine yards. ## **Mulled Wine**

- ½ orange sliced

 4 cloves • 60 ml /2 fl oz gin As usual, please remember to drink sensibly. Ed

Leftover turkey and potato pie The best thing about Christmas food is the left overs

#### Ingredients for 8 people

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, chopped
- 680g/1lb 8oz leftover turkey, diced
- 6 tomatoes, seeds removed, diced
- 150ml/1/4 pint chicken stock
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 225g/8oz diced leftover vegetables (carrots, parsnips and sprouts)
- 115g/4oz frozen peas
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 450g/1lb roast (or pre cooked) potatoes
- 25g/1oz melted butter

#### Method

- Heat the oil in a large pan and add the onion and chopped garlic. Cook until softened but not coloured.
- Add the chopped turkey meat and cook until lightly coloured. Add the diced tomatoes, pour in the stock and Worcestershire sauce and bring to the boil.
- Simmer until it starts to thicken, then add the diced vegetables and peas and return to the boil. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper and pour into a large pie dish. Allow to cool.
- Preheat the oven to 200C/400F/Gas 6.
- Slice the roast potatoes and lay carefully on top of the turkey mixture. Brush with melted butter and bake until hot in the middle and the potatoes are coloured, about 30 minutes.

## Mistletoe

This Christmas favourite is the only member of its family to be found in the UK but has the largest range of the 1500 species worldwide. Technically known as the European White Berried Mistletoe (Viscum album), it is a hemi-parasite of trees and is the only native plant to have white berries. Whilst plants can be found on any species of deciduous tree, nearly 50% of the UK population grow on cultivated apple trees. Mistletoe prefers open grown trees that receive lots of light, hence it's love of orchards and gardens. Despite Cambridgeshire being a fruit producing area mistletoe is not a common plant locally. Climate rather than habitat availability dictates the plants range. Its stronghold in the UK being the fruit growing counties of the Southwest where a warmer, damper climate provides ideal conditions for the plant. Indeed, the mistletoe is the county flower of Herefordshire.



Mistletoe has an unusual life cycle. Whilst the leaves will photosynthesize, it relies on its host to provide the water and minerals it needs. The seeds need to stick to a suitable twig or small branch where it grows one or more stems called hypocotyls, these specialist structures grow down and attach themselves to the bark of the host. There are then no more outward signs of growth for 12 months, but the hypocotyl works its way through the bark and attaches itself to the underlying cambial cells causing a lump to grow which is made up of tissue from both the host and the mistletoe. Once this connection is established the mistletoe commences to grow into its normal form. Birds are relied upon as the only means of seed distribution, with various species, including the well-named Mistle Thrush, feeding on the berries. Most birds swallow the berries whole and therefore when the seed reappears it is very hit and miss as to whether the seed will land on a suitable branch. However, increasing numbers of overwintering Blackcaps are changing that. Rather than swallowing whole, blackcaps tend to pick the berry apart and the seed sticks to their bill (the scientific name for Mistletoe can be translated as white goo) which they wipe off on a convenient branch. A much more satisfactory outcome for the mistletoe.

But the Christmas link, and the kiss? In medieval times a plant that grew without roots and stayed green throughout the year was considered magical. Amongst its attributed properties were the ability to cure fits, regression of tumours, finding treasure, deterring witches, as an aphrodisiac and an aid to fertility. The latter of these continued into the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, particularly in the areas where the plant is abundant. Up until the first world war mistletoe and hawthorn were harvested near new year, made into decorations and burnt to purify the land and ensure fertility for the next years' crop. In the late 18<sup>th</sup> century academics began to research the ancient Druidic and Celtic religions and rites and mistletoe became a popular decoration. Although, to begin with, it was banned from churches, its popularity continued to rise. The more extreme practices associated with it, involving golden sickles, white cattle and virgins, were toned down, culminating in the chaste Victorian kiss under the mistletoe that is part of our traditional Christmas to this day.

## RHS Top Gardening Jobs for December

As we approach the shortest day of the year in December you will need work to keep you warm outside, such as digging and tree pruning. Hopefully there are not too many jobs left to do this year so you will have time for some fireside garden planning.

- Check your winter protection structures are still securely in place
- Check that greenhouse heaters are working
- Insulate outdoor taps and prevent ponds from freezing
- Prune open-grown apples and pears (but not those trained against walls)
- Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding Find more details on the Royal Horticultural Society website https://www.rhs.org.uk/advice/in-month/december
- Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and remaining root crops
- Trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted
- Take hardwood cuttings
- Keep mice away from stored produce
- Reduce watering of houseplants



## RHS Top Gardening Jobs for January

January might be the middle of winter but as the days lengthen the garden starts to grow. Now is a great time to plan for the coming year and order seeds and plants. Enjoy the fresh air on and check your winter protection, stakes, ties and supports are still working after any severe weather. Put out food for birds, leave some garden areas uncut, a little longer, to provide shelter for wildlife.

- Prune apple and pear trees
- Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring
- Keep an eye on watering houseplants
- Plant now to boost the winter fragrance in your garden
- Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- Keep an eve on fig and olive and guard against frost by covering with sacking or old fleece in frost
- Start forcing rhubarb
- Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- Cut off hellebore leaves at the base to discourage black spot disease and show of the flowers.




## The Population of Grafham 1841 to 1911 Part 10, where did the farmworkers live in 1841 and how were the farms beginning to change? Edward Biffin

I can at last set out on the first part what I know about where the farmworkers of Grafham lived from 1841 to 1911 – with the caveat that those who lived in 'Low Grafham' up to 1861 are still a bit of a mystery (see the preceding articles). In 1841 the Census only split the parish into 'East End' and 'West End', with the Rectory as the dividing point. At this time 'Village' and 'Rectory'/'Glebe' farms did not exist, but the 'Great House' (now the Caravan Site) was the base for a substantial farm, as was Top Farm (site behind the current Top Farm Cottages, which did not then exist). And the stables and farm buildings which are now Lakeside Mews were the centre for quite a few agricultural jobs. Then, down the Brampton Road, the 1835 Ordnance Survey map shows a dwelling on the moated site with three or four more in a hamlet beyond – very little change from the 1750 'Estate'/1774 'Inclosure' maps.

The 1841 Census 'East End' notes six agricultural labourers in dwellings in the village centre, convenient for the 'stables'. There were a further three, plus a youngster, on the Brampton Road Moat site plus five in former cottages associated with Top Farm or with the Olivia Bernard Sparrow charity accommodation. Then down the Buckden Road, Grafham Lodge, which had been rebuilt in 1835 but still had the remnants of the previous 'Empys' estate house on site (with its 'landed proprietor' in situ) also had four old agricultural labourer cottages, and seven agricultural labourers plus a boy were in residence. If the workers listed 'before' Grafham Lodge in the Census were actually accommodated on the Lodge site, this would explain some of the dwelling 'shortage' noted in my October article. For examining the site we have the 1774, 1887 OS, and, crucially, the 1852 OBS Estate map which not only reflects the position in 1852 but also has overwritten changes by the mid 1860s. From this we can see that the 1835 Grafham Lodge and the older Empys and some other buildings (dwellings?) existed together in 1852 and it was Empys that was demolished and the 1854 barn courtyard built over it, after which it became Model Farm.

Model Farm 1887

The 'West End' starts with the White family as farmers at the Great House – it had kept that name although the mansion had been demolished and replaced by the current 16<sup>th</sup> C building – together with a servant and two labourers. A further 13 agricultural labourers – and a carpenter and a boy – were available from cottages on both sides of Church Road between Rose Cottage and Ambleside. However some of these were smallholders – three small fields including Malt Acre still survive – and would have made some income from their own activities. The small hamlet beyond what is now Orchard Row had seven or eight dwellings in 1774 but only one was occupied in 1841 – a small farmer named George Bitten. Twenty years later his holding is recorded as seven acres. Finally we come to Hill Farm (run by the Armstrongs and independent of the Bernard Sparrow-Duke of Manchester families) and Low Farm (site now under Grafham Water). Hill Farm Cottages and a number of dwellings on the Low farm site housed 13 agricultural labourers including three boys.

## **OUT AND ABOUT**

(An occasional rumination on life in and around Grafham)

I thought that this was going to be just the usual bogstandard tale of my most recent stroll around the local area, but, unfortunately, these walks have had to come to a halt; for the time being at least. Sadly, I have to report that my fourlegged companion who normally accompanies me on these strolls died quite suddenly a few days ago and, quite simply put, this has left me and the missus utterly bereft.

I always referred to her as 'the dog', but if you are interested in knowing, she was called 'Laika' (like the Russian space dog of the 1960s); some of you know her well. Despite being a pedigree 'Boxer', she was quite a messed-up, mash-up of a dog physically, and had one of those faces only a mother could love.

This was a dog that gave us so much in the way of joy and laughter and yet asked for little in return. She was, in short, quite a remarkable character and wholly irreplaceable, and we miss and mourn her loss dreadfully.

I do realise, of course, that there are many people who simply don't have pets of any kind, never mind dogs, so I apologise if this particular 'homily' seems rather self-indulgent. In my defence, I wouldn't call myself a 'dog person' particularly, and I'm certainly not keen on attempts to anthropomorphise animals generally – the use of the term 'fur-baby' being one cringeworthy example! Nevertheless, these creatures that

live easily alongside us (dogs especially) seem to have developed a very successful method of attaching themselves to us to the point where we see them as being more than mere 'animals'. It's quite clever really and,



quite brutally, simply a survival tactic developed over many thousands of years to ensure that they get food and shelter - it most definitely works! You do find yourself wondering who really is the more intelligent of the two species?

Beyond this, their characteristics often put our own species to shame as well. How many times have we been let down by the failings of other human beings? Our dogs give themselves unconditionally and their behaviours often manifest themselves in the form of qualities we perceive as loyalty, devotion, steadfastness, reliability and companionship. No wonder some of us prefer them to human company.

As for dear old Laika, I think it will take some time to simply come to terms with her passing. She has left quite a hole that will be very difficult to fill. I have tried to 'hold it together', but occasionally I catch a glimpse of the now redundant lead or a silent squeaky toy and then the bottom lip starts to wobble and the eye becomes moist. The reminders are many, far too many.

We do take some comfort in knowing that despite the loss that we feel, she at least had a pretty good old life on the whole, and that every time we walk along one of her favourite routes, we will always have that overriding sense that she is with us and won't be forgotten.

Anyway, that's enough from me other than to add my thanks for your condolences, your patience, your indulgence, and not least of all, your keen interest in mine and Laika's walks over the past couple of years or so. I wish you all a long and happy walk, with or without a dog!






