HDC Local Government Reorganisation - Update

We have been informed by the Government that the anticipated announcement on Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough was not made on the 16th of July 2026 as previously expected.

However, the Government has advised that this decision has been delayed and is now expected to be made by October 2026. Further information is being sought from Government, including an explanation for the delay.

Grafham to Brampton Quiet Lane - Update

The Quiet Lane works have been temporarily paused to allow alignment with the recently agreed maintenance and resurfacing works on Brampton Road / Grafham Road. As you are aware, pre-patching works (filling in the potholes) was recently carried out. These works were carried out to allow time for the surface to settle and firm up. The full re-surfacing will then be done later, at the same time as the main Quiet Lane works, under a second road closure. We will confirm the dates for this as soon as we can.

A Thank You to Our Watering Volunteer

The Parish Council would like to say a big thank you to the kind resident who has been voluntarily watering our playground hedge!

Thanks to their kindness, these newly planted shrubs are staying alive and healthy particularly in this very hot weather! We truly appreciate you looking out for our shared spaces!

Football Club

The Football Club has completely withdrawn from hiring the playing field and have now removed their container.

Do you like to shop in St Neots, Huntingdon or St Ives?

Plans developed by Capital & Centric in partnership with Huntingdonshire District Council, will transform the following car parks:

Tebbutts Road car park in St Neots into a mixed-use development. The proposals include two five-storey buildings with up to 83 homes, commercial units, a walled garden and a community pavilion surrounded by green open space.

The Cattle Market / Waitrose carpark in St Ives + Bus Station could become a neighbourhood with 120 homes, a gym and restaurants.

Princes Street car park and Huntingdon bus station into 78 new homes, a 'centralised hub' for business, and new green spaces.

The developers have submitted plans and a consultation is underway. If you have any comments to make on this please contact your District Councillor Cllr Stephen Cawley whose details are below.

- Tiger Pass Holders (Under 25 yrs - you need to apply for a FREE pass, see website below) £1 per journey, ask for the 'Reduced' fare option when booking. Show your pass to the driver when you board.

Is your landline your lifeline?

Landlines are changing. By January 2027, traditional landlines will be upgraded with digital technology. This national upgrade is known as the **Digital Switchover**. It means that landline calls will be made over the internet instead of the old telephone network. Telephone providers are re-sponsible for switching customers to the upgraded service, but everyone is encouraged to check if and how the change will affect them.

Do you rely on a personal alarm or telecare device? It's important to check how the Digital Switchover will affect you, especially if you rely on personal alarms or telecare devices (like fall detectors or life-lines), which may stop working.

For many, the change is simple. All you will have to do is plug your landline phone into a broadband router instead of a traditional phone socket. But if you don't have an internet connection at home, or if you rely on your landline every day, this change might affect you more.

Three things you can do now to prepare for the Digital Switchover

- 1. Call your phone company** – Ask if the change affects your phone line or any connected devices. Ask to speak to customer services and use the number on your most recent bill.
- 2. Ask for help if you need it** – A trusted friend, family member or neighbour can help you make the call to your phone provider or speak to your provider on your behalf.
- 3. Watch out for scams** – Your phone provider will **not** ask for money upfront. If something does not feel right, hang up and call the official number.

The good news is landlines are not going away, you can usually keep your existing phone and number, and it's the responsibility of your phone company to guide you through the process. We know that for many people, the landline is more than just a phone - it's a lifeline. That's why **Connecting Cambridgeshire** is here to help make sure no one is left behind.

Don't wait - call your phone provider today

Local libraries and community champions are providing information hubs for vulnerable residents

Recognising that older and more vulnerable residents are best supported in trusted, community locations, libraries are acting as information hubs for the campaign. Every library, including community and mobile libraries have free printed information about the Digital Switchover. Vulnerable residents, for whom their landline is a lifeline, should ask for a copy of the leaflet "Prepare for the Digital Switchover in 3 easy steps". RHS Top Gardening Jobs for September

September is generally a cooler, gustier month than August and the days are noticeably shorter. While there's not as much to do in the ornamental garden at this time of the year, if you have a fruit or vegetable patch, you'll be busy reaping the rewards of harvest. It's also time to get out and start planting spring-flowering bulbs for next year and you can collect seeds for next summer's colour too. Make the most of the remaining warmth while you can!



1. Divide herbaceous perennials
2. Pick autumn raspberries
3. Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them
5. Net ponds before leaf fall gets underway
6. Keep up with watering of new plants, using rain or grey water if possible
7. Start to reduce the frequency of houseplant watering
8. Clean out cold frames and greenhouses so that they are ready for use in the autumn
9. Cover leafy vegetable crops with bird-proof netting
10. Plant spring flowering bulbs

Ten years of living with EVs in Grafham

There are now lots of electric vehicles and hybrids of all makes in Grafham and I thought it might be a good time to reflect upon the experiences of our EV journey.

In 2016 our faithful Seat Alambra was on its last legs and costing close on £100 to fill up with diesel. Our Accountant said that given the tax incentives and Government grants we should buy an electric car. There was not much choice at that time. We chose a Mitsubishi Outlander PHEV, a hybrid, which came with a complimentary 3.5kW home charger.

At that time I had a daily round trip commute to Daventry of 100 miles. The Outlander only had a range of 25 miles on pure electric but it would decide when best to use this with the petrol engine cutting in when necessary. Fortunately near where I worked, Daventry Council had installed a bank of 3.5kW chargers that were available for free use. I was able to get a full electric charge at both ends of my journey. The clever car worked out the electric usage percentage for the journey at 70%. My 500 mile weekly commute was now made up of 350 miles of cheap or free electricity and only 150 miles on petrol. Visits to the petrol station became less frequent. When we went on longer trips we would not bother with electric charging unless we fell over a charger.

In 2020 we went fully electric with a Nissan Leaf 64kW. The cost of change on the trade-in was £15000. The range on full electric was 220 miles. The car had two charging sockets, one for the 3.5kW home charger and the other a Chademo, for fast charging. More of that later. The national charging network was in its infancy and most Motorway Service Stations only had one or two Chademo charging points and there was usually a queue to use them. Given that it took close on an hour to fully charge the car this could be frustrating. Luckily most of our usage of the car was local and covered by the home charger.

When our daughter went to study in Newcastle we had to plan our travel. Using the ZAP MAP app we would map out our charging route. We would make an early morning start and get to Blythe Services and bag a charger. From there we would contact Nissan in Newcastle who allowed Leaf owners to charge at their showrooms for free and book a slot.

Forward to 2026. The charging network is now massive and



each Motorway Service Station has 100s. Our car will only charge at a maximum of 50kW and still takes 45 minutes to give a us an 80% charge, but at least there no queues. We did consider changing the car when Nissan dropped the Chademo in favour of CCS charging sockets that are now the industry standard. However, a clever engineer developed an adaptor which for £500 enabled us to connect our Chademo socket to the CCS chargers.

Our car has only done 46,000 miles. It has cost £1000 for new discs, pads and tyres. Servicing, now that it is out of warranty, is reasonable and only every other year. The battery health is still at 100% and after nine years we have only just started paying Road Tax. It would resell for about £10000. Our mileage has dropped away since being retired and we rarely take it on long journeys. We have Octopus Energy as our electricity supplier and use the five hours overnight charge of 8p per kWh rate and power ups during the day to charge the car.

On to the maths and money (approximately). The 220 miles range divided by 64 kW gives 3.5 miles per kW. It costs (3.5 x 8p), 28p per hour to charge overnight and each hour puts 10.5 miles into the battery. Five hours of overnight charging costs £1.40 and puts 52.5 miles into the battery. If we need more miles we just charge for longer at the slightly higher rate. Should we need to quickly charge the battery then we can go to the Shell garage at Buckden which currently costs 60p per Kw which equates to £39 for 220 miles.

The Leaf is here to stay for the foreseeable future and petrol stations only for a cheeky Greggs.

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Little Fishes Stay + Play sessions
meet on Wednesday mornings in
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Sausage, squash and apple tray bake

September sees British apples and squashes ripen. Here is a tray bake recipe that uses both. Grasmere sausages from the shop would be good. The recipe serves 6

Ingredients

- 1 small butternut squash, about 750g
- 2 red onions, sliced into rings
- 2 cooking apples, unpeeled, cored and sliced
- 12 pork sausages
- 3 tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 tbsp runny honey
- 1 tsp English mustard
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 15g/½oz fresh flatleaf parsley, finely chopped, to garnish – if you like



Method

1. Preheat the oven to 220C/200C Fan.
2. Cut the squash into quarters and leave it unpeeled. Remove the seeds then cut each quarter into 5mm slices.
3. Place the squash a very large baking tray with the onion, apple and sausages. Drizzle with 1 tablespoon oil and season well with salt and pepper. Roast for 20 minutes.
4. Meanwhile, whisk together the honey, mustard and remaining oil in a small bowl. Drizzle over the sausages and vegetables and turn to coat everything in the dressing.
5. Return to the oven for 10 minutes until the sausages are browned and cooked through and the vegetables are tender. Sprinkle over the parsley, if using, and serve.
